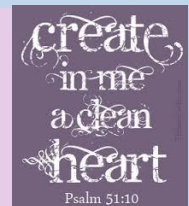
If you will be attending virtually, a Zoom link will be sent out a week before the retreat.

From the mouth of a Benedictine Baby:



When Gabriel Barr was born, our sisters gifted his parents (oblates Daniel and Priscilla Barr) with a onesie bearing the stencil: Benedictine Baby. Gabriel is now a year older than this picture, but still associates this statue with his vision of Saint Benedict. The family was recently visiting Priscilla's parents in Arizona from where Daniel sent the following conversation—too cute not to share.

Daniel says—Today when I was getting dressed, I was putting my oblate pin on.

Gabriel—”Is that a cross?”

Daniel—”Yes, it's a special cross for St. Benedict.”

Gabriel—”Is he the one who climbed a ladder to see Jesus?”

Daniel adds: He always associates St. Benedict with the ladder statue (by the Benedictine Center on the campus of the University of Mary), but I think on the whole that's not a bad one-line description of the saint.

Oblate Formation Program

As we seek new oblats to join with our community in living the Benedictine way of life, we again begin plans for the fall cohort of the formation program. The program begins anew in October and meets one Saturday morning a month for about three hours for twelve months ending with final Oblation.

We have now completed the first half of the second cohort of the new program with a cohort of four candidates, one inquirer and five current oblats. All report a very positive experience which gives a thorough grounding in the Rule as well as the practical aspects of living the Benedictine charism as a layperson.

We extend our prayers and sympathy to the families of these recently deceased oblates and family members:

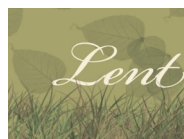

Dear Friends—Knowing that I have left little space to offer a lead-in to the Lenten season, I reflect on a call to simplicity that often strikes me at this penitential time. It stands in contrast to a consumer view of society that values acquisition instead of renunciation. Elsewhere in this newsletter I have recommended the new book by Benedictine oblate Esther deWaal— *The White Stone: The art of letting go*. We are all called to this journey, and this Lent, I am particularly called to embark upon both spiritual and material "house cleaning." When a sister passes into Eternity, it is the responsibility of some sisters in the monastery to sort through her personal possessions and make a determination of their future use. Family items are passed on to close family members, items pertaining to her religious life and ministries often go to our Archives, sisters are invited to select a memento of the sister to remember her by. This year, I seek to make this task as simple as possible for those who will do this when I die by divesting of family items to family now and leaving much less to be sorted. We all have our ways of "letting go"—not just of things, but of old hurts, regrets. May yours be an occasion of joy rather than sadness, leaving you this Lent feeling a little less burdened—ready for the Paschal Mystery to unfold once again.
